Legislative Affairs Report Information

Periodically, MOAA will lobby Congress to take legislative action to preserve our retiree benefits. The probability of favorable legislative action is in direct proportion to the number of voters who register support. NASA Perseverance MARS Launch

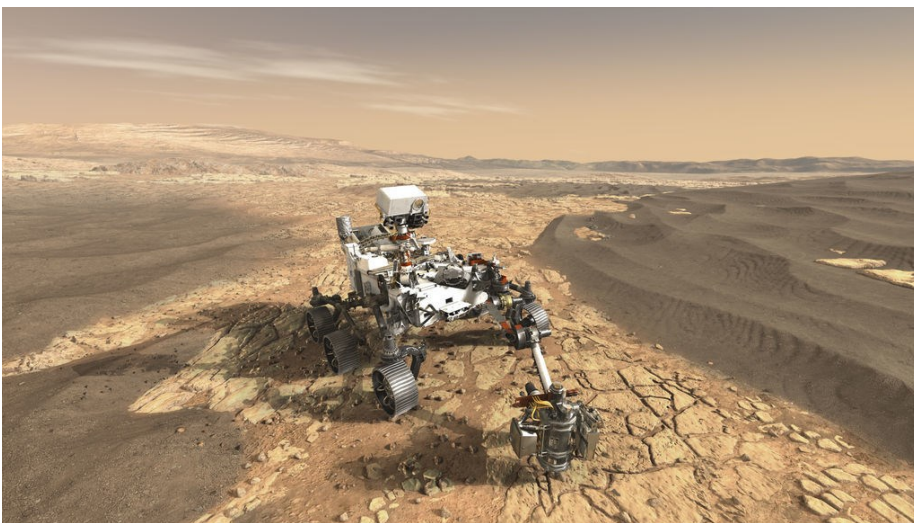

The Gathering for August 13 (Virtual) hosted the presentation on Channel 1970 of a re-broadcast of the Perseverance Launch to Mars followed by the NASA Press Coverage after the Launch. The actual Launch of Perseverance from the NASA flight center in Florida occurred on 30 July 2020, and it will touch down in Jezero crater on Mars on 18 February 2021. Mars 2020 is a Mars rover mission by NASA's Mars Exploration Program that includes the Perseverance rover and the Ingenuity helicopter drone.

As Gathering host Bill Hilsman indicated, the press conference featured NASA program engineer Matt Wallace, son of Millie Wallace. We have been fortunate in the past to have Matt as a guest speaker talking to us about the development of the Mars Rover program, but in the virtual world, he was a prominent member of the press conference on the NASA broadcast following the launch.

Now the Rover is important, but for Falcons Landing, we need more information on Matt. Fortunately, NASA has a great web site that tells all. Matt Wallace is the Mars 2020 Deputy Project Manager. He initiated the concept work for the mission and has led the development and implementation team since 2013. Perseverance is the fifth Mars rover on which Matt has worked. He began as a power systems engineer on the Mars Pathfinder Sojourner vehicle, led the assembly and test team for the twin Spirit and Opportunity missions, which landed in 2004, and held the Flight System Manager position on the 2012 Curiosity mission. Matt graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, MD, with a B.S. in systems engineering, and received an M.S. in electrical engineering from Caltech. He has served in the US Navy fast attack submarine fleet.

Now back to the Mars program. The best way to stay current with the program it is to turn to the NASA website: mars.nasa.gov. You will be kept busy for the day reading about the program. There are 3 prospects for non-resident membership, and 11 prospects for Chapter and Auxiliary memberships.

Legislative Report: Clair Wylie. The June and July Legislative Reports were published and distributed. Assisted residents in requesting absentee ballots.

Auxiliary: Vicki Estey. No volunteer hours recorded from April through August 2020. The Johnson Center remains in Phase 2, and there are a few small activities, video chats, and Face Time sessions. Residents are allowed to sit on the patio or eat in the Dining Room or Terrace, space available. Spouses may visit based on a case-by-case evaluation and are tested weekly. Pastor Jeff has renewed his sessions of Reflections. Only Lauren and her staff are allowed to deliver mail. There is no Physical Therapy and no Specialist physician care.

Public Affairs: Don McCarthy. Photograph has not yet been sent to MOAA for the article they plan to publish. We need Don Poorman (Community Church) to visit to have one taken (with Howard and Bob). MOAA feedback on grants: there is a form that recipients can sign to permit publication of photos and data.

Speakers Program: Max Johnson. The program is now on hold. The schools at which the programs are held are not in session. We may be able to have some Zoom presentations as conditions persist.

JROTC: Stan King. A recent graduate from Chantilly Academy AFJROTC wrote a letter to our Chapter thanking us for the scholarship he received. He will be attending Christopher Newport University. His father is an active duty Navy officer and lifetime member of MOAA.

Personal Affairs: Kathy Trossbach. Received 18 calls with questions on closing the estate. Sent 2 sympathy cards with enclosed 1st steps then followed up with telephone calls.

Loudoun Veterans and Family Support (LVFS): Howard Schue. In July we assisted 2 veterans for a total amount of \$1600. In August through today, we assisted 5 veterans for a total amount of \$1448.81.

Virginia Council of Chapters (VCOC): Bob Manning. VCOC is requesting Chapter input for their newsletter. The October meeting will probably take place via Zoom. Legislative and Member chairs are to be filled.

Summer Storming Two commenced on August 8 and is scheduled to run through September 30. The primary issue continues to be a halt to proposed military medical billet reductions. We will receive our 5-Star Level of Excellence (LOE) award in the mail. There is no award ceremony this year. As part of our ongoing VCOC homepage renovation, a chapter announcement section has been added.

Loudoun County Community Veteran Engagement Board (LCCVEB): Jim Mullen. Tom Grant reported that many people needed support and thanked Falcons Landing MOAA Chapter for our support of their efforts. He asked for support of the virtual job fair, for veterans in Loudoun, to meet military-friendly employers, e.g., updates on our webpage. We may be able to help. Peter Scott is a member of the committee.

The Gathering: Bill Hilsman. On August 13 presented a virtual briefing on the July 30 Mars launch. The September schedule has not yet been released.

President's Updates: Bob Manning. **Veterans Day:** Will be similar to last year with live broadcast, versus on tape, on November 11. To include recognition of World War II veterans in residence. **The Auxiliary:** Bylaws were approved. Per the new bylaws, spouses of deceased members (Surviving Spouses), spouses of living Chapter members, and others must formally apply for membership in the Auxiliary. A committee will define the procedure to become an Auxiliary member. **Nominating Committee:** Per our bylaws, a Nominating Committee shall be appointed in September of the year in which an election occurs. Our President plans to become Immediate Past President and Webmaster. The Nominating Committee Chair should be a Board officer-member.

The Gold Star Families Memorial, September 11, 2020

On Sept. 11, a Gold Star Families Memorial, honoring local Gold Star families, was unveiled in Lovettsville, VA. A Gold Star family refers to the immediate family members of a service member who died while serving in a time of conflict. Following the town's 9/11 ceremony earlier in the day in the town center, about 200 people proceeded to visit the One Family Brewing property south of town to witness the unveiling of the nation's 65th, and the region's first, Gold Star Families Memorial Monument. Attending the ceremony were representatives from the county, including Board of Supervisors Chair Phyllis Randall, Ashburn Representative and Mike Turner (fellow member of our MOAA chapter), Sheriff Mike



Chapman, and a number of veterans' organizations members. Also present were representatives from the Marine Corps headed by Brigadier General David Morse, two Medal of Honor recipients, and a number of Gold Star families. Jim Mullen and Lowell Jones, representing the Loudoun County Veterans Engagement Board and our MOAA Chapter, also attended the dedication. The guest of honor was Medal of Honor recipient Woody Williams. Woody was awarded the medal for action on Iwo Jima in WWII. On the day the flag was raised on Iwo Jima's Mt. Suribachi, his unit was bogged down in a heavily fortified area. Woody, with the aid of cover fire from only four Marines, used a flamethrower to attack enemy machine gun pillboxes. After destroying several Japanese positions, he opened a gap in the Japanese defenses, which enabled the Marines to move ahead. For his actions, Williams received the Medal of Honor in 1945, from President Truman. He was also awarded the Purple Heart after being wounded on March 6. Hershel "Woody" Williams, now a former Marine (Chief Warrant Officer, retired), is the last surviving Medal of Honor recipient of 27 recognized from the Iwo Jima conflict. He is 96 years and fast moving. Several years ago, he was instrumental in setting up the Hershel Woody Williams Medal of Honor Foundation to recognize Gold Star families by installing Gold Star Memorials across the nation. He told the audience that the sacrifices of American soldiers must never be forgotten. He mentioned that out of the more than 1,000 monuments in Washington, DC, there are none that specifically honor Gold Star families. Several years ago, after speaking with a Gold Star family member at a Gold Star Memorial meeting, Woody realized the need to recognize families and formed his foundation.

Several residents of the Lovettsville area had formed a committee to have such a memorial for the town, led by the owner of One Family Brewing, Dave Keuhner. They worked with the Hershel Woody Williams Medal of Honor Foundation to get the job done and arranged for the dedication of the memorial in September. During the ceremony, Dave Keuhner told attendees that his life was spared on Sept. 11, 2001. Mr. Keuhner said he had canceled his planned flight to California four weeks prior to the terrorist attacks. That flight ended up being the flight that hit the Pentagon. "This is your memorial," Dave told the Gold Star families in attendance.

To pay for the memorial, more than \$52,000 was raised through individual donations, beer sales, and events throughout the last 14 months. Some costs were offset by donations from area companies including donation of rock to distribute around the Memorial, donation of concrete for the base, and support from contractors for the construction. Among those speaking at the event was Mike Ryan, whose father, U.S. Marine Corps 1st Lt. William Ryan, was shot down and killed in Vietnam at the age of 25 in 1969 when Mike was one day shy of his first birthday. He said U.S. service members have "hero blood." "Many of you here today have that blood," he told the Gold Star families. "Nothing can adequately prepare families for this," he said. "That's what this memorial is really all about—is never forgetting." Former U.S. Army Staff Sgt. and Medal of Honor holder Clint Romesha—who fought alongside U.S. Army Spc. Stephan Mace, a former Purcellville resident who was killed in Afghanistan in 2009 and was awarded the Medal of Honor in February 2013, told the families there is no replacing their loved ones. "They wrote that blank check for the country, and they paid in full," he said. "We will always remember, and we will do it together."

Lovettsville's Gold Star Memorial is made of black granite and features one side that reads "Gold Star Families Memorial Monument," a tribute to Gold Star Families and Relatives who sacrificed a Loved One for our Freedom." The other side tells a story through four panels with themes of homeland, family, patriot, and sacrifice. A 30-foot flagpole displaying the American flag has also been installed. Once unveiled, dozens of Gold Star family members came forward and placed photos of their deceased loved ones at the base of the monument, many with tears running down their cheeks while doing so. There are now 65 Gold Star Memorials located across 48 U.S. states, with 75 more in progress. If you happen to be out for a drive, the Lovettsville memorial is open for viewing at the invitation of Dave Keuhner and would be worth the trip. P.S. Lowell and I are glad we made the trip. It was a moving experience

An Air Attache in Latin America

Fellow resident Colonel Mark Jones (USAF Ret) was the guest speaker at the September Falcons Landing Gathering. Mark began his career in the Air Force as an intelligence officer and then, after flight training, as a KC-135 tanker pilot. Following those early assignments, he was sent to Caracas, Venezuela for three years as an assistant air attaché at the U.S. Embassy, where he also flew the Embassy C-12. He was also accredited to the Dominican Republic, Haiti, and Jamaica. Later at the Pentagon, he worked on the Air Staff in Foreign Military Sales. From 1986 until 1990, he served as the Defense Attaché at the U.S. Embassy in Tegucigalpa, Honduras. This also included acting as the Air Attaché at several neighboring countries. Returning to Washington, he served as Director of the Air Force Office of Attaché Affairs until retirement in 1994. He then worked as an independent contractor with the CIA until 2007. In retirement, Mark is a docent at the National Air and Space Museum. He is also a member of the Defense Attaché System Hall of Fame. Mark covered his experiences in both Venezuela and Honduras.

The Defense Attaché Hall of Fame identifies the recipient's role (that's Mark): to collect and report intelligence to represent the Service Secretary in the host country, to provide the ambassador with military advice and assistance, and to serve as Defense and Air Attaché. (A note: having a C-12 is an added benefit in getting about and meeting the mission. Mark quietly leaves a few details of his time in Venezuela to the imagination).

During his time in Venezuela, Mark visited Angel Falls, at 3312 ft, the tallest waterfall in the world, and he noted that it was named for the American who discovered it—Jimmy Angel, who landed his airplane on top whereupon his wheels were stuck in the ground, and it couldn't be moved. He also had a discussion with a Venezuelan officer about possible future military aircraft for Venezuela. Mark suggested the F-16 and later was posted to the Pentagon where, in his military support assignment, he helped procure F-16s for Venezuela. Mark's second tour of duty as attaché was at the U.S. Embassy in Honduras, where he was the Defense Attaché and Air Attaché (and made good use of the C-12 from time to time). This was during the time of conflict between the socialist Sandinista forces in Nicaragua and the Contra forces—a coalition of right-wing rebel groups who were based in large part in Honduras. The Contras were the various U.S.-backed and funded right-wing rebel groups that were active from 1979 to the early 1990s in opposition to the socialist Sandinista Junta of National Reconstruction of Government in Nicaragua. Mark could have written a book on the subject of the Nicaraguan conflict, but instead presented his assignment from the perspective of the role of the Attaché with numerous examples of the various activities that faced his office. He noted that, in 1987 during the Contra situation, more than 5,000 visitors of all ranks and positions, from Secretary of State to Defense chiefs, came to Honduras creating the responsibility to have, in effect, a visitors bureau function. Of course, Ollie North was part of the scene.

Mark remembers overlooking a ravine to a meadow below that contained 6,000 Contra forces singing the Nicaraguan National Anthem, a visit from the USS Iowa, and the impact of drug traffic—including one situation of providing information leading to the capture back in the U.S. of 8,000 pounds of cocaine from a Honduran ship that had traveled to a U.S. port. Then there was the opportunity to gather intelligence on a HIND helicopter belonging to the Nicaraguan Air Force and the discovery of an unexpected capability of a radar-warning receiver.

Another event related to arranging support through the Navy and Coast Guard for the rescue of two fishermen who were lost at sea. A final story relates though to another side of the attaché's job, when he arranged to gather a treat for the embassy staff from a McDonald's—not just a little effort but about 60 Big Macs plus other portions of a McDonald's meal for the total staff—and the gift glasses that went with such a large order.

Mark ended by citing a gift to him of a souvenir AK-47 from the Contra military as he was transferring back to the United States, which unfortunately he had to leave behind. In telling us of his experiences from Venezuela to Honduras, he gave us an interesting insight to the world of the military attaché.
